PROHIBITIONISTS HOLD CONVENTION IN PORTLAND

Portland, May 5.—With Eugene W. Chaffin, twice prohibition candidate for president, and Virgil Hinshaw, national chairman of the Prohibition party, among those scheduled to deliver addresses, more than 300 members of the state are in convention here today for the purpose of nominating candidates for state offices and adopting a platform. Little more than temporary organization was accomplished at the morning session. At noon a luncheon was held at the Portland hotel at which a number of prominent speakers exhorted the prohibitionists to fight hard to make the state dry at the November election.

Judge Galloway Grants One Divorce —Other Items of Interest from Court.

Judge William Galloway was to have heard final argument in the case of the state land board against T. B. Kay, state treasurer, an action in the circuit court for Marion county to recover \$5,000,000 in school notes in possession of the state treasurer, this morning but on account of the fact that Attorney General A. M. Crawford could not get here in time the final determination of the suit was continued until Saturday. The attorney general was at Pendleton yesterday and was unable to get here in time.

Two Binejackets Die.

Washington, May 5.—Two more of the bluejackets shot at the capture of Vera Cruz died today, according to a report received from Admiral Bagier. One was Clarence Hirschberger, who succumbed at 1 a. m. to shock following the amputation of his right leg at the thigh on account of complications incidental to his wound. He was a seaman on the Utah. The other, Harry Pulliam, a fireman, died from a wound which had paralyzed the lower half of his body. He breathed his last at 8 a. m.
