When he arrived in Dallas his passenger asked Mr. Prime to wait and his friend would pay for the hire of the machine, and when the friend did appear he informed Mr. Prime of the condition of his fare and Bradford was brought back to Salem and delivered over to the institution. He was committed from Elkhart several months ago. Now Mr. Prime is wondering who is going to stand for the hire of his machine, and, while the state will not stand for it, it is expected that Bradford's relatives will pay him for his trouble and expense.

The case of the state of Oregon against F. A. Hyde, A. S. Baldwin, C. W. Clarke and C. W. Clarke & Co. was filed in the circuit court of this county today by Attorney General Crawford. This is an outgrowth of the famous Hyde-Benson controversy and is taken up here only as it applies to seven parcels of land in Marion county. Hyde the other parties in the suit were induced to make false, fraudulent and illegal entries and by the corrupt practices of Hyde were enabled to secure possession

SHEPARDSON—At his residence, in Morningside addition to Salem, Oregon, sometime during the day of Thursday, November 19, 1914, David Shepardson, aged about 85 years, of sudden illness attending old age.

Deceased has lived alone in the home which he purchased several years ago, consisting of a house and three acres of land, and, as he was a frequent visitor and did not put in an appearance on Thursday at the homes where he was in the habit of delivering milk, butter and eggs, and his neighbors missed him. This morning upon making an investigation, they found the door locked, and upon peering through the window discovered him lying across his bed. Coroner Clough was notified and repaired to the house and was compelled to break in the door to secure entrance, and found Mr. Shepardson dead upon his bed fully dressed. Nothing is known concerning the cause of death, but as there were no marks of violence upon the body or indication that death had been induced from causes other than natural, and Mr. Clough concluded that he was a victim of heart failure. He has no property other than the home which he occupied, so far as the neighbors and friends know, and money to the amount of \$7.50 was found in the clothing upon the body. He has a brother in Riverton, Nebraska, who has been notified of his death by telegraph, and Mr. Clough will await instructions as to the disposition of the remains.
