THIRD REGIMENT SHY IN SOME THINGS

Deficient in Bayonet Drill and Use of Small Arms Says Inspector

According to the report of the officer who inspected the Third Regiment, Oregon National Guard in the early part of 1914 this organization would make a poor showing in a hand-to-hand scrap with an enemy if drilling in the handling of the bayonet has anything to do with it. That officer, in his report as endorsed in the biennial report of Adjutant General Finzer, filed yesterday in the Journal, finds that little or no bayonet exercise has been given the troops of the Third regiment and he expresses his regrets in the neglect in this very important branch of military instruction.

He also calls attention to the lack of instruction in small arms firing and says that every facility should be furnished the citizen soldiers and encouragement offered them to participate in such instruction. Aside from not knowing much about the nomenclature and care of the rifle, shortage of personal equipment for some of the officers of headquarters, field and staff and the indifference to drill instruction on the part of some of the units of the organization, he pronounces the condition of the regiment very satisfactory. In summing up the condition of the regiment in general the inspection of five days:

"Very generally the officers lack several articles of personal equipment, and the headquarters field and staff a number of articles of these equipment."

"Several companies are reported as having had no, or practically no instruction in small arms firing, which is to be regretted. These companies should be furnished with every facility for this instruction and effort should be made to have them participate therein. "The very good condition of the small arms in this regiment is noted with satisfaction as it indicates a realization on the part of the officers and men that the value of an organization as a battle unit depends materially upon the condition of its weapons."

"Army drill and instruction throughout the regiment is rated from good to very good. It is noted, however, that in the majority of cases instruction in bayonet exercise was poor or not held at all. This is greatly regretted, in view of the importance of the form of instruction, which not only develops the soldier, but inculcates the morale which makes him seek hard to hang combat. Only those troops can be counted upon to make an assault with a view of driving the enemy from his position who have been so trained that is their belief that with the bayonet they are superior to the enemy."

"In every company it is reported that not sufficient attention is given to instruction in the nomenclature and care of the rifle."

"It is noted with satisfaction that the majority of the companies are above the prescribed minimum strength. On the other hand, several of them report a large number of men are not having been present for drill and instruction twenty four times during the calendar year 1914."

"In general, the condition of this regiment as set forth in the inspection reports, may be stated as very satisfactory."

SILVERTON MAN ACCUSED OF FRAUD

Portland, Ore., Dec. 18.—Charging that W. M. Meehan, formerly a liquor dealer at Silverton, Ore., had failed to keep proper accounts of his business transactions in anticipation of bankruptcy, for the purpose of defrauding his creditors, A. M. Cannon, special master, this morning reported to the United States district court that Mee-

han should not be discharged from bankruptcy. Meehan failed February 26, 1909. When his business was examined by Referee in Bankruptcy Chester G. Murphy, charges of perjury, concealment of assets and fraud were placed against him. Cannon has been investigating the charges made by Murphy and his report is the result.

CHILEAN CABINET QUILTS

Washington, Dec. 18.—A dispatch received this afternoon by the state department from Santiago reported the resignation of the Chilean cabinet. No details were included in the dispatch.
