Trading Was Broader; Market More Interesting

New York, Aug. 10.—Trading was broader and the market more interesting today than yesterday, with a sustained rise in railroads as the feature.

The buying of these stocks was based partly on the splendid crop showing and the expectation that the western roads will soon get an increase in freight rates from the interstate commerce commission.

One of the most interesting developments was a sharp rise in the stocks of railroads which penetrate the western grain country. They showed general gains, with the best buying seen in weeks past.

There was good demand for Union Pacific, St. Paul, Northern Pacific and Southern Pacific.

Industrials were strong and active with new high marks for several "war stocks." Steel shares attracted great attention, a rise in United States steel being based partly on reports that the common dividend was to be resumed.

Dealings generally reflected some increase in the volume of outside business and the activity in railroads indicated clearly that the market had gained from news reports since the crop figures were announced.

Maple Hill, Kan., Aug. 10.—Standing off more than 100 citizens, several bandits blew open the vault of the State bank here today and escaped with \$3000. The early morning fog aided the robbers. A posse started in pursuit.

Paris Says Attacks Repulsed. Paris, Aug. 10.—Strong night attacks delivered by the Germans in the region of LeFretre forest were repulsed with heavy losses, it was announced today.

Enemy infantry attempted to storm the French positions for an extended bombardment by artillery, the official communique stated. The attacks were repulsed under shrapnel and rifle fire.

Returning after the first attacks, the Germans made new assaults with the aid of poisonous gases. The French retired before the gas fumes, but delivered counter attacks when the gas had been blown away by the wind.

Russians Will Evacuate Vilna. Petrograd, Aug. 10.—The Russians are preparing to evacuate Vilna. The libraries and museums of the city have been removed, according to dispatches here today.

Vilna is 55 miles east of the besieged fortress of Kovno and has direct railway communication with Petrograd. It is about 225 miles northeast of Warsaw. It is toward the Warsaw-Vilna-Petrograd railway that the Germans have been driving in their attempt to block the Russian retreat.

Bavarians Control Warsaw. NNNz, thiont... Berlin, via wireless to Sayville, Aug. 10.—Prince Leopold, commanding the Bavarian troops in control of Warsaw, has proclaimed ample protection for the citizens and property of the city.

Lomza Is Captured. Berlin, via wireless to London, Aug. 10.—The Germans have stormed the fortress of Lomza, the war office announced today.

The capture of Lomza gives Field Marshal Von Hindenburg possession of four of the five fortresses guarding the Warsaw-Petrograd railway between Nowogrodek and Grodno. Only Osowetz now remains to delay his advance.

Lomza is 80 miles north of Warsaw and 20 miles north of Ostroienka, which was captured in earlier fighting. General Von Flack broke the Russian line about Lomza yesterday and entered the city this morning, the official statement said.

East of Warsaw the Bavarians pursuing the Russians who evacuated Warsaw and Praga have advanced several miles and are now near the Novo Minsk-Stanislowl road.

Reporting the operations on the western front, the statement admitted the British had recaptured the western part of Hodge, as claimed yesterday.

Villa Rescinds Order Levying On Foreigners. El Paso, Texas, Aug. 10.—General Villa today rescinded all orders for war levies on foreigners and restored all property confiscated from foreign and American merchants in Chihuahua under a recent decree.

This action was taken following a conference with General Scott, chief of staff of the United States army. He met General Scott on the American side of the border and conferred with him for four hours. It was said there would be no further meeting between the two.

Russ Warships Bottled By Germans In Riga. (Continued from Page One.)

Russian seaplanes and warships which co-operated in repelling the attacks.

German Objective Defeated. Petrograd, Aug. 10.—Definite defeat of the major objective of the Austro-Germans—the capture and utter rout of the Russian field armies—is claimed in unofficial dispatches here today.

The forces which Field Marshal Von Hindenburg sought to surround in the Warsaw district are declared to have escaped the trap set for them. They are now said to be retreating in orderly fashion upon the line running in a northwesterly direction from Siedlce, to the east of Warsaw.

By withdrawing from Praga, the Warsaw garrison has also made good its retreat, it is declared.

From the extreme southeast before Field Marshal Von Mackensen's army to the Courland district, where General Von Buelow is attacking, the Russians are said to be retreating slowly to the Brest-Litovsk line, parrying the German thrusts east of the Narva river and inflicting severe losses on the enemy in the region of Kovno.

Despite the great exertion by the Teutonic armies and the shelling of fortresses in a manner comparable to the attack made upon Przemyel, they have been unable to pierce the Slav lines and put the field army to rout.

No impression has been made on the 11 forts surrounding Kovno, though these fortifications have been under
