Gene E. (Cowing) Radmacher

September 1, 1924 – October 7, 2015

Gene was born September 1, 1924 in Troutdale and passed into the loving arms of her Savior on October 7, 2015. She was 91 years old.

Gene lived in Portland most of her life before moving to Sisters in May of 2014 to be near both her children.

Gene served in the Civil Air Patrol for two years. She worked as a bank teller in both Gresham and Portland for about three years. But it was in Gresham that her brother-in-law introduced her to Bob Radmacher. She and Bob were married six months later on August 18, 1945.

With the arrival of their first child, in May of 1948, Gene became a full-time homemaker, in which she greatly excelled in hostessing, cooking, baking and especially caring for her family.

Gene loved her Lord first, Bob and her children next, and finally others. She was a longtime member of Hinson Memorial Baptist Church in Portland where she taught sixth-grade Sunday school for 20 years before retiring to attend her age class. When she moved to Sisters, she transferred her membership to Sisters Community Church.

She loved attending and supporting every sporting event her children participated in, be it football, gymnastics, wrestling or cheerleading — and even musical events.

Gene loved Tolle and primitive art painting, of which she took 40+ years of classes becoming quite proficient and accomplished.



Gene also loved to travel. Going back to the sixth grade, she determined she would one day see the Taj Mahal, which she eventually did in 2009, plus 56 other countries, some numerous times.

We will miss you Mom, but we take much comfort in knowing you are with our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ ... as II Corinthians says, “absent from the body [is] to be present with the Lord” ... to which we all say a hearty “Amen!”

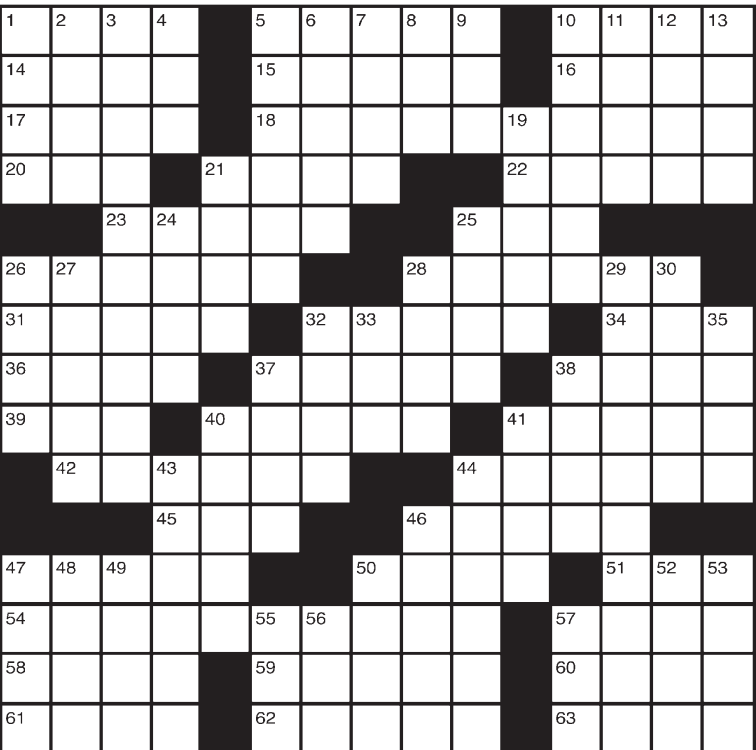

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Woman escapes serious injury in deer collision

A Terrebonne woman got a forceful reminder that deer are moving around on the highways on Monday.

On October 26 at about 7:30 a.m., OSP troopers and emergency personnel responded to the report of a vehicle-versus-deer collision on Highway 20 near milepost 96, three miles west of Sisters.

Preliminary information indicates a 2006 Cadillac Escalade was traveling westbound on Highway 20 when a buck mule deer attempted to run across the highway. According to the driver, just prior to impact the deer jumped and crashed through

her windshield. The driver was able to safely bring her vehicle to a stop.

The driver, Vona Huggins, age 79, of Terrebonne, received minor injuries and was transported to St. Charles Medical Center in Redmond. The deer died from the collision. It is believed the deer’s antlers struck the steering wheel, stopping it from further entering the passenger compartment and preventing further injury to Huggins.

The public should be reminded October is peak time for deer migration in Oregon, with more deer-versus-vehicle collisions than any other month.
