Project Unify is part of Special Olympics and "allows students with and without intellectual disabilities the opportunity to train and play together as teammates."

The Outlaws Project Unify team includes a cohort of amazing student mentors from the high school and students from the Special Education programs of all three Sisters schools. Some of these kids have never held a basketball, and thought they had no interest in the sport. Others desperately wanted to play, but health issues prevented them. Now all of them are basketball stars.

Many of the mentors are athletes on other Outlaws teams, others are academics. All of them exhibit an incredible degree of compassion and altruism. They never take the spotlight. Given the choice to make two points or pass to one of their teammates who might not make the basket, our mentors always choose the latter.

Which brings me back to last Friday's game. The Project Unify team from Bend's Mountain View High School cancelled, so the Sisters teachers and administrators stepped up to fill the void. Coached by Mike Geisen and featuring Joe "Meadowlark" Hosang, Heather "The Animal" Johnson, and Mario "Tasmanian Devil" Saraceno, the Sisters "Bandits" gave our Outlaws a game worth playing.

The kids clearly wanted to win. Who wouldn't want to beat their own teachers? But our mentors stuck to their playbook, even in the face of The Animal, giving Sam, Brian, Max, Andrew, Zack, Gabe, and Michaela a chance at basketball glory.

The stands were filled with classmates, parents, neighbors and community members. Announcer Neil Fennel added color and excitement. Every score raised a cheer, and our Outlaws prevailed 46-34.

Josh Nordell, Bill Mitchell and Sherri Hermens, with the support of Tim Roth and the entire Sisters community, have built something amazing. Our disabled kids are getting a chance many never get: to be part of a sports team. And our mentors are getting the chance to experience the beauty of selflessly helping others.

Church offers Shrove Tuesday meal

The Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper on February 9 from 5 to 7 p.m. will provide supper for an entire family for \$10 at The Episcopal Church of the Transfiguration in Sisters.

Shrove Tuesday is the same day on which Mardi Gras is celebrated, the last day before Lent begins. In 2016, Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 10.

The observance of Shrove Tuesday began during the Middle Ages. Then, as now, particularly in certain parts of the world, food items like meats, eggs, milk and fish were restricted during Lent. To keep such foods from being wasted, they were shared in a feast so they would not spoil

during the next 40 days.

"Shrove" is derived from the word "Shrive" which means to confess and receive absolution. So, it is a day of repentance before a period of fasting that is observed by many during Lent.

Here in Sisters, everyone is invited to share in this tradition. The Episcopal Church of the Transfiguration is located at 68825 Brooks Camp Rd.

The menu includes all-youcan eat buttermilk, plain, and blueberry pancakes, sausage, variety of syrups, homemade applesauce, orange juice, coffee and tea. Cost is \$4 for adults; \$2 for children ages 4 to 12, children under 4 are free; \$10 per family of four or more. All are welcome.

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
