She pretty much lost feeling in her hands, which makes it hard to play. This was a great match, and I was frankly

surprised at how well they rose to the occasion!"

Mary Florian lost to Jessalyn Losa 4-6, 1-6, in No. 4 singles, but still played a great match. Florian was able to get a lot of balls back, and Fullhart noted that her consistent play from the baseline makes her a natural for singles play.

Fullhart said, "Even though we got clobbered, I was encouraged by — and proud of — the girls' performances today. I predict that by the end of the season, when we've had a little more time on the court and have our line-up sorted out, we will be a force to be reckoned with.

"I knew we weren't going to win a lot of matches, as we have had very little court time due to the recent weather conditions. And, we have 22 girls this year, and half of them are new to the team this year. That makes for a rocky start, but I see a ton of potential with this group. They are an amazing group of girls, and an absolute delight to coach."

The Lady Outlaws will resume play with a match at Stayton on Thursday, March 31.
