Archery hunters urged to beware of fire danger

The last full weekend in August means the start of archery season for deer and elk. And like every start to hunting season, bowhunters will be faced with high to extreme fire danger across Oregon.

"It's already been a tough fire season," says Oregon Department of Forestry's Fire **Prevention Coordinator Tom** Fields. "While we have been fortunate with minimal lightning-caused fires, our concern is with human-caused fires."

Close to 90 percent of the nearly 600 fires started on ODF-protected lands in 2016 are attributed to people. That compares to the 10-year average of about 65 percent.

The concern among the hunting community is with campfires, smoking, and off-road vehicle use, all of which are either prohibited or restricted to certain areas. Hunters are encouraged to check fire restrictions before

"We see more houses out east of town having to drill their wells a lot deeper now," Miller noted.


