A 63-year-old Portland man died on Tuesday, August 30, on the South Sister trail approximately 4.5 miles from Devil's Lake Trailhead, the Deschutes County Sheriff's Office reported.

9-1-1 dispatch received a call at 11:08 a.m. from hikers on the South Sister trail who had located a male hiker face down and unresponsive. The man was later identified as Tom Shakespeare of Portland.

The hikers immediately called 9-1-1 and began CPR. CPR efforts were not successful. A trail maintenance technician arrived and agreed to remain with Shakespeare until Deschutes County Sheriff's Office personnel arrived.

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Sisters Eagle Airport seeks state recognition

Sisters Eagle Airport has requested inclusion on the Oregon Department of Aviation's list of "airports of state concern," according to ODA planner Jeff Caines.

However, airport manager Dave Campbell told *The Nugget* that no formal application has been made.

The listing would include a boundary map, much as a site plan is part of a landuse application for a development, Caines noted. The potential scope of the airport boundary has raised concerns among some citizens because of the possibility that "airport activities" within that boundary might fall within the auspices of the state and

leave land-use decisions outside local control. A boundary map that has been circulated in association with the request includes Eagle Air Estates and skydiving drop zones that have been in use through the summer.

Caines emphasized that any current boundary map does not have the status of a formal proposal yet - and the process for evaluating any such proposal has not begun.

"We've requested, show us a boundary; show us what we'd be looking at," Caines said.

"We haven't started the initial process on completeness yet," Caines told The Nugget. "In order for us to move forward, we have to

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USFS closes gravel pit to shooters

The U.S. Forest Service has received increasing complaints about irresponsible target shooting west of Sisters. According to Forest Service representative Amy Racki, residents of Crossroads and users of the Jimerson Trail are concerned about their safety because of target shooting at the McKenzie Gravel Pit off Highway 242.

"The issue is that people are using McKenzie Gravel Pit for shooting, and it does not have a good backstop to stop bullets," Racki said. "People are shooting toward the residential area and Jimerson Loop Trail with no backstop."

Forest Service regulations make it illegal to "discharge a firearm ... in any manner

or place whereby any person or property is exposed to any injury or damage." Accordingly, the gravel pit has been designated as a "high recreational use area." Racki reports that a warning sign explaining the rule,

and penalties involved, was posted at the site and subsequently shot up.

The Crossroads community is 655 yards from the gravel pit, and the Jimerson

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
