director). During our conversation I asked David if he could use an electric scooter. David answered in the affirmative, but couldn't afford one and VA would take too long."


Barrier told the Coast Guard veteran that the scooter would be a gift from Sisters Band of Brothers.

Raptors seize library walls




All through the month of September an exhibit on raptors will be featured in the Community Room of the Sisters Library.

Kevin Smith up in Crooked River Ranch dropped off a bunch of his shots of raptors taken near his place. Al St. John, local expert and author on herptiles, dropped off three of his raptors. Local artist Jennifer Hartwig jumped right in with owls and eagles scratchboard

Birder Tom Crabtree's work will be included. He's one of the original members of Central Oregon Audubon that eventually became today's East Cascades Audubon Society, and his great gray owl portrait, which normally hangs in the Anderson house, is spectacular. And wait 'til you see Charlie Baughman's eagles!

Baughman has the good fortune to live in one of the Deschutes River canyons between Bend and Redmond; his home is about a footballfield-length from an active golden eagle nest. He often sat on his deck, camera in hand while "Chester" and "Kitty," owners of the nest,

nodded at him as they went out foraging for their kids.

Abbott Schindler from Bend has three pieces in the exhibit: an osprev shaking water out of its feathers is a barn-burner. In addition to the California condor, Jodi Schneider has hung a portrait of a waiting Cooper's hawk at a bird-feeder glaring at you — "Get out of here and leave me be!"

Tom Davis' photo of a family of long-eared owls portrays a surprise on the owls' part at seeing a camera staring them in the face. Sue Anderson's adult ferruginous hawk swooping over us while your corespondent bands its kids shows that species in almost all white plumage.

Fellow Sisters Area Photography Club member Linda Ziegenhagen has a great horned owl photo in the exhibit with a framing job that's spectacular; while on the west wall of the community room this reporter has hung his favorite owl photo.
