A color guard of John Ferguson (U.S. Air force); Wendell Halterman (U.S. Navy); Jim Mandell (U.S. Air force); and Bill Anttila (U.S. Navy) presented the colors for the National Anthem, sung by the 7th/8th grade choir.

Seventh-grader Greta Davis read her winning Patriot's Pen "The America I Believe In" essay to the audience, closing with the note: "Thank you very much to our veterans for serving our country and contributing to these many rights and freedoms in our country. Bowe presented a

slideshow of photographs from his service in the 173 Airborne in Vietnam in 1966-67. Bowe saw extensive combat.

"It seemed like every time they sent us out, we got in a firefight," he recalled.

Bowe was twice wounded, the second time severely. He recounted the challenges the soldiers faced that went well beyond enemy contact - terrible weather conditions, jungle that looked green and lush but created hellish conditions.

"There were no good days in Vietnam," he said.

And Bowe is acutely aware of the cost. He also recalled an emotional visit to the Vietnam War memorial in Washington, D.C.

"I know a lot of people on that wall," he said. "I served

with some really, really great people, and they are the heroes of this nation.'

Bowe told the assembled youngsters that he recommends service in the military, especially for those who aren't sure what direction they want to take in life and career.

"That opens a lot of doors for a lot of people," he said.

While the observances were duly respectful and tinged with somberness, they were also rousing, with the band and choir serving up strong renditions of patriotic music.
