Roundabout to serve as Central Oregon gateway

When the new roundabout at the Highway 20/Barclay/McKinney Butte intersection is completely finished, there will be native landscaping, lighting, and a singular piece of artwork in the center.

According to Abbey Driscoll, the Region 4 community liaison for the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT), the artwork will denote the roundabout "as a gateway to the city of Sisters, the Central Oregon region, Deschutes National Forest, and the McKenzie Pass-Santiam Pass National Scenic Byway."

She also said that the artwork will "reference the theme, 'A Journey Through the Passes is a Journey Through a Land of Contrast,' which is the theme of the Scenic Byway, and describes the unique natural environment of Sisters."

Beginning last June, a process was undertaken by the Sisters Arts Association, Sisters Ranger District, City of Sisters, and ODOT to acquire an appropriate piece of artwork to serve as the centerpiece of the round-about. This process included securing funding, determining the selection committee and technical advisory committee members, writing the call for artists (RFP), and determining requirements for art on a state highway.

"Each partner has been instrumental in this process," said Driscoll. "ODOT and the Sisters Ranger District (U.S. Forest Service) cowrote the initial application for funding. The City took the lead in convening all partners, including Sisters Arts Association, on a monthly basis to write the call for artists and determine the final selection process."

A nationwide call to artists is being launched on the CaFE for Artists website (CaFE = Call for Entry). The Sisters Arts Association and Sisters Ranger District will make up the art selection committee whose job will be to narrow down the field of submissions to eight
