down, forward, sideways, and backward. The hummingbird

can also hover in the same place. This means that this

little bird can flap its wings so fast that it seams to float

in the air at times. This amazing ability to fly comes in

handy because hummingbirds are the MMA fighters of the

bird world. Male hummingbirds are very territorial. They

are so territorial that they have been known to try to

fight their own reflection in a window.


There are more than 300 different hummingbirds that live only in the western hemisphere. They live from Alaska down to Central America. They normally live in Mexico and Central America during the winter and migrate north during the warmer months. Some migrate all the way across the Gulf of Mexico flying as much as 500 miles (804 kilometers) in one day. They do this for two main reasons. The first is the availability of food in the winter and the second is that hummingbirds have fewer feathers than other birds and it is harder for them to stay warm.

> Hummingbirds live primarily off of nectar. Nectar is mostly sugar and is naturally made by plants. They feed during the day and prefer brightly colored flowers. Some people even make artificial nectar using water and sugar and put it in feeders near their house so they can

watch these tiny birds eat. Hummingbirds eat half their body weight in nectar every day. That would be like an adult human drinking 900 to 1000 cokes a day. That's a lot of sugar. Don't think that is all they eat though. Hummers also eat insects. One of their favorite meals happens to be spiders.
