ON THE POLITICAL HORIZON

In no presidential election in the history of the nation have the problems of the country, in external as well as domestic relations, been so grave, so great and so numerous as at this time. They are social, commercial and humanitarian as well as political in their nature. The entire structure of foreign relations must be rebuilt. Definite declarations must be placed in the party platforms. Candidates have been prudently guarded in their expressions before the convention but these indicate the skirmish line which later will become the battle line. No man in America has a better knowledge of the immigration question in its relation to the East than Senator Johnson because of the situation in his home state. He is a man to take an unequivocal stand and is expected to express himself in the meeting to be held in Portland on the evening of the 14th instant. General Wood has clearly indicated his position in the well defined expression that "The doors of the United States are open to all who come seeking liberty, but we should not admit any aliens whose sons and daughters cannot intermarry with ours." This may be taken as an indication of the Republican attitude toward this very important question. America's future depends in a large measure on the immigration policy of tomorrow. The exploiters of America's resources have openly been laboring to bring Asiatic labor into the American market. The views of the men who loom as presidential possibilities on this question will be welcomed by the public. The evil of the policy of the wide-open door is coming to be more generally understood in its relation to labor as well as its social significance. The Asiatic does not blend with the races in America and therefore must be excluded.

Of the young men of Oregon there is probably none who has sacrificed more, and who is giving more of himself for the principles underlying good government than Dow Walker of Portland, who as a republican is candidat for delegate to the National convention from the 3rd Oregon congressional district. Like many others he returned from service overseas with a higher regard for our institutions and a keener sense of duty toward them. Service in the A. E. F. constituted a postgraduate course in citizenship. His activities for civic improvement and clean and vigorous administration of public affairs stamp him as one to be implicitly trusted to do his part in shaping the policies of his party for the best.

John K. Kollock, who is candidate for the important but unrenumerative position of delegate-at-large to the Republican National Convention at Chicago, Mr. Kollock has practiced law in Portland for 25 years and believes that his partisan activity fairly entitles him to the favorable consideration of his fellow republicans, and there are others who think likewise.

Fred D. Weber, Republican candidate for representative, 18th representative district, comprising Multnomah County, was born in the year 1880 in California. Received his education in the public schools, Berkeley High School and graduated from the University of California, 1904, in electrical engineering. In vacation worked for the State on river improvements. Served a two-year apprenticeship course in the shops of the - Westinghouse Electric Manufacturing Company at East Pittsburgh, Pa., one year with Bullock Electric Company at Cincinnati. During the war he made inspection reports on shipyards and munition

plants in Oregon in regard to fire protection for the National Board of Fire Underwriters for the Shipping Board, Emergency Fleet Corporation. Since 1919 he has been vice-president of the State Board of Engineering Examiners for Oregon and member of the Electrical Hazards Committee of the National Safety Council for Oregon and Columbia Basin Division. He owns his own home in Portland, and his slogan is "Continued presperity with lowest possible taxes."

D. C. Lewis, candidate for state senate from this district, is one of the most affable and approachable of men, and as ready to take off his coat for the cause of the common people as to grant a personal favor, for which reasons he has many friends who are supporting his candidacy.

Governorship Succession. The proposed amendment to the constitution to be on the ballot May 21st, is known by the short title of "Successor to Governor" amendment. It provides that "in case of the removal from office of the governor, or his death, resignation, absence from the state or other inability to discharge the duties of his office, the president of the senate shall become governor until the disability be removed or until the vacancy is filled at the next general biennial election." It also provides that in event both the governor and the president of the senate should be unable to discharge the duties of the executive office the speaker of the house shall become governor to serve until the disability be removed, or until the next biennial election. The amendment provides further, that a governor elected to fill a vacancy shall serve for the unexpired term of the governor whose death, resignation or other disability brought him into office.

The committee on arrangements for the Republican national convention at Chicago, June 8, has selected Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, as temporary chairman. Senator Beveridge of Indiana is regarded as the probable choice for permanent chairman. The impression prevails among party leaders that the league of nations fight undoubtedly will be touched upon by Senator Lodge and that a plank indorsing the peace treaty and the league covenant with the reservations

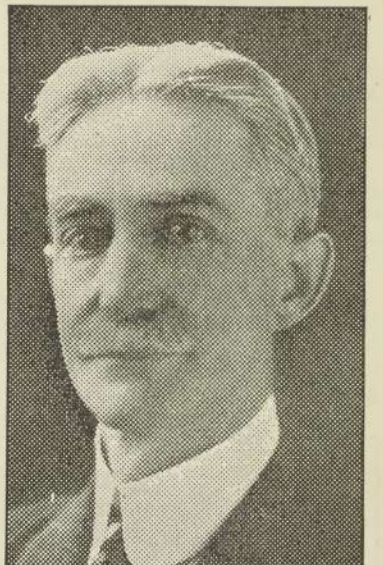
