

## June Singer, Jungian Analyst

Dr. June Singer is the author of *Boundaries of the Soul: The Practice of Jung's Psychology and Androgyny: Toward a New Theory of Sexuality* as well as *The Unholy Bible: A Psychological Interpretation of William Blake*. Singer earned her Ph.D. from Northwestern, taught at the University of Chicago, and received a diploma in Analytical Psychology from the C. G. Jung Institute in Zurich. This week in Eugene, she will address "The Many Levels of Man/Woman Relationships" and conduct a dream workshop (see Friday's and Saturday's calendar listings for details). You can also catch Dr. Singer in a 30-minute public access television interview on Cable 11 at 7 pm, Monday, November 15, repeated at 9 pm Wednesday, November 17.


In *Androgyny*, June Singer richly describes the opposing complementary life energies present within the psyche as contrasexual elements which require human recognition and understanding. She traces the archetypal androgynous figures of gnosticism, alchemy, astrology, the Kaballah, the Tao, world creation myths, and Christianity, to say nothing of world literature and dreams.

Singer's real skill, however, lies in precisely how she shows this ancient concept of the soul to be of vital concern for modern men and women. Look within, she advises. In order to be meaningfully involved with one another, she suggests, the inner-marriage must have taken place. A new state of wholeness comes when we no longer need to think of ourselves as exclusively "masculine" or exclusively "feminine," when we know that we are whole beings in whom the opposite also is present. Perhaps Dr. Singer will show us how this act of responsibility, this inner-marriage, relieves relationships of unnecessary expectations and creates a psychological environment in which the partner can be perceived as the companion, the friend.

## Matter of Heart

*Matter of Heart* is a new, two-hour documentary film about the world of the Swiss psychiatrist, Carl Gustav Jung, a twentieth century pioneer who explored the human psyche and its inward reaches of the unconscious. The film is peopled with some of those who were closest to Jung—as students, patients, friends, relatives and neighbors. The settings are their settings—San Francisco, New York, London, Zurich and Bollingen—where they live and work and where they knew Jung. The themes embrace their everyday realities and conflicts shared with Jung; the mysteries of working through problems in marriage and analyst-patient relationship, the courage and patience required to engage with the reality of the collective unconscious and their visions of our present task: to take individual responsibility for the expansion of creative and destructive energies coming into human hands in our time.
