"Give Children Art," a comprehensive project to develop and promote effective, affordable supplementary arts activities for Lane County's schools, is being undertaken this year by the Lane Regional Arts Council, LRAC announced this week. The project's goal is to design arts activities and services which meet school districts' needs and can be successfully integrated into their curriculum and budget plans. Activities might include artist residencies and teacher workshops in the fine arts, folk arts or crafts; one-time class workshops in performing arts such as dance choreography or street theater; assembly-type programs by members of local performing companies; or hands-on teacher training sessions in the arts. An initial project phase has involved an assessment of current strengths and needs of arts education programs in Lane County schools.

Sandra Harder, LRAC Arts Education Program Coordinator, emphasized that activities developed and promoted by "Give Children Art" (GCA) will be offered as additions to, rather than substitutes for, regular school arts curriculum. A major focus of the project will be to foster cooperation between Lane County's many community cultural resources and its schools in order to provide the best possible exposure to the arts for Lane County students.
