State legislators have been introduced to a new job creation effort—The Southern Willamette Research Corridor. The Corridor combines the resources of Oregon's two research universities, two community colleges, and five communities, as well as a handful of private groups, into an economic partnership. The Corridor packages the exceptional educational and community assets already available in the southern Willamette Valley for marketing efforts outside the state. Research Corridor representatives believe the program will bring new business and jobs to Oregon.

In describing the Corridor to the legislators, Steve Burkett, Springfield City Manager and Chair of the Corridor Committee, explained that it "takes full advantages of what we already have, and by doing so, enhances the overall quality of life in Oregon."

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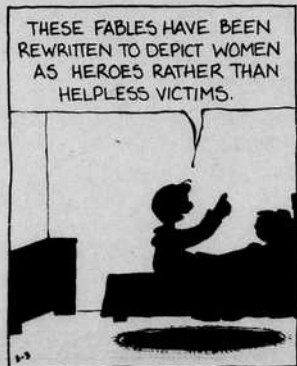
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
