

Long Tom Archaeological Survey Underway

University of Oregon anthropologists have launched a large-scale archaeological survey of the upper Willamette Valley and are seeking the cooperation of landowners so the project can be completed by May.

Centered on the Long Tom River drainage northwest of Eugene, the survey is intended to provide researchers more information than is now available about the native Willamette Valley people, the Kalapuya, according to Kathryn Toepel, a UO doctoral student in anthropology and project director.

"The information we expect to gain from this survey about the distribution of different types of archaeological sites such as winter villages and summer camps will help us to reconstruct settlement and land use patterns," she said. "The data also will enable us to interpret what we know about the few sites already investigated in a regional perspective."

At present, 42 archaeological sites have been recorded in the project area, Toepel said. Among these is the Flanigan Site near Junction City, the only prehistoric site in the Willamette Valley currently on the National Register of Historic Places. She expects 200 or 300 additional sites will be recorded during the survey.

Doing the field work in two-person teams are UO graduate and undergraduate students of archaeology who are getting practical training in survey methods. No items will be collected without owners' consent. Letters explaining the survey and requesting access to their property will be mailed to all 700 affected landowners in the 14-by-12 mile survey area. Further questions can be directed to K. The survey is being conducted by the Oregon State Museum of Anthropology, with partial funding by the state's Historical Preservation Office.

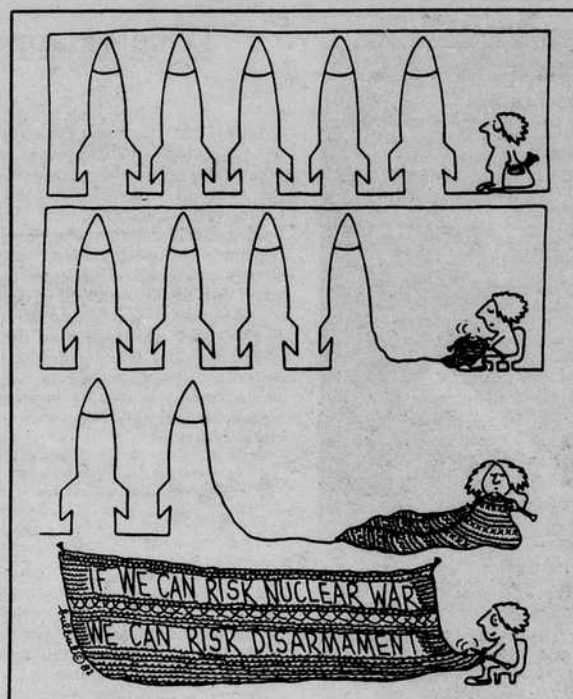
