Olympic Scientific Congress



Today (Thursday, March 10) at 9:30 am in the Hilton, there will be a news conference announcing the progress in planning and funding of the Olympic Scientific Congress. Scheduled to participate are Dan G. Tripps, executive director, Olympic Scientific Congress; Gus Keller, mayor of Eugene; John Lively, mayor of Springfield; and Paul Olum, president, University of Oregon.

This congress is scheduled for July, 1984, just prior to the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles and is expected to attract thousands of specialists in areas such as sports medicine, biomechanics, physical education, health, sports information and sports psychology. Members of more than 40 national and international organizations will participate in the event, expected to be the largest conference in the history of Eugene/Springfield.

In addition to the numerous scientific sessions, this event will include a series of major interdisciplinary sessions discussing major issues in the world of sports such as aggression and violence in sport, impact of competitive sport on youth, human genetics and sport, and sport and gender. The Congress is intended not only for the specialists but also lay people interested in sports.

The Congress is being held as an official part of the Olympic Festival and is sponsored in part by the US Olympic Committee, and is under the patronage of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization.

The Selective Service Law Panel of Los Angeles has just released a documentary videotape entitled *Don't Let the Draft Blow You Away*. This one-hour documentary is designed to provide an alternative to the official government position on draft registration and provides concrete information about the options available to potential draftees and urges them to obtain draft counseling. The videotape features interviews with Daniel Elleberg, Congressman Ron Dellums, draft lawyer Bill Smith and others including several public non-registrants.

This tape is available for purchase at cost to any organization or individual engaged in anti-draft activities. The 3/4-inch format costs \$50, the 1/2-inch VHS costs \$25.
