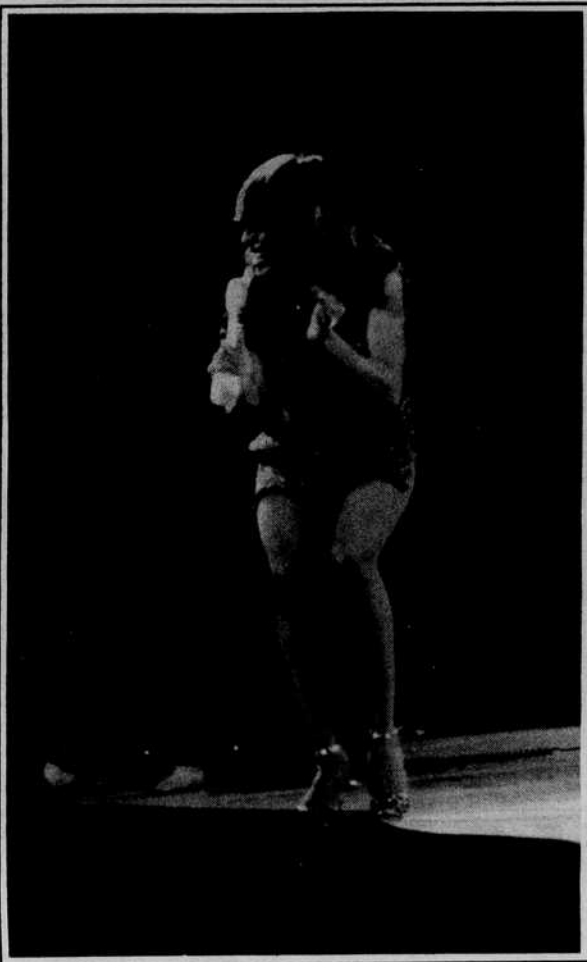

Book Review:

The Secret

The Secret, by Sean Kelly, Ted Mann et. al., a Byron Preiss Book/Bantom Books, November, 1983. \$9.95.

The Secret is one of the funniest books I've read in years. It is not just funny, but cunningly funny.

The book elaborates on the descendants of the Fair People: goblins, fairies, leprechauns and other fantasy creatures we have all known in some form or other.

These modern day creatures who, forced by the encroachment of humans, have evolved into forms of spirits and sprites which are integral to modern life.

Most of the book is "A Field Guide to Fair People." It is laid out like a field guide for birds, only instead of birds, you are told how to recognize and find creatures like the Maitre D'eamon, found in the finest restaurants; the Foul Sewer Ogres, habitate . . . you guessed it; the Freudian Sylph; and the Prep's Ghoul.

Each of the dozens of entries give range, habits, history, and spotter's tips. The text is delightfully funny.

There is something universally amusing about such creatures as the Household Unfamiliars, who wreck havoc in the refrigerator when the door is shut; the Sylph who lives off the sweat of joggers; the Night Mayor, who causes all those dreadful things that happen in a city at night.

The book also contains a challenge to match clues found in verses and photos of painting to discover caches of buried jewels.

The book is perfect for a gift, preferably for someone in your family, so it will be in the house for you to read. You can't help but laugh aloud.
