Computer programming, biological experimentation and creative writing will be offered in the U of O's third annual summer program for talented and gifted preschool and elementary-aged children. Set for June 27-July 22, Super Summer '83 is a non-residential enrichment program for children aged 4 to 12 who possess demonstrated or potential abilities for high performance in intellect, academic achievement, creativity, leadership and performing or visual arts. Participant selection is based on parent and school referrals and evaluations. 686-3481.

The issue of nuclear arms control will be the topic of the first set of programs in a new series sponsored by the Social Concerns Committee of the Unitarian Church of Eugene. The first one was held March 30. The next ones will be on the first 3 Sundays of May.

Lab research not before open to physically limited scholars now is possible with a pneumatically elevated wheelchair created through the efforts of several campus and community groups. The chair lets students gain as much as 18 inches more in seated height and makes possible involvement in lab projects not previously accessible to them. The additional height allows, for example, use of anchored microscopes and access to shelves of chemicals and other materials for experimental work. The homemade chair is the product of financial donations of local Rotary and Kiwanis clubs and shop time from UO sciences programs which adapted an unused wheelchair donated by Eugene's Sacred Heart Hospital.
