

Award-Winning Journalist to Visit

Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist Anthony Lewis will give a public talk on individual and press rights and will participate in an open conversation with Oregon Supreme Court Justice Hans Linde during his April 3-8 visit to the University of Oregon.

As the 1983 holder of the Wayne Morse Chair in Law and Politics, Lewis will also meet with faculty, students and community members in classes and informal discussions planned by the School of Journalism, School of Law and the International Studies Program.

Lewis will speak on "The Public and the Press" at 7:30 pm Tuesday, April 5, at the Eugene Conference Center. The talk is open to the public without charge.

On Friday, April 8, the UO law school's Board of Visitors has arranged a dinner which will feature a dialogue between Lewis and Linde on libel issues. The event at the Valley River Inn begins with a 6:30 pm social hour followed by dinner at 7 pm. Tickets for the dinner, open to the public, are \$15 each.

On Wednesday, April 6, Lewis will participate in activities at the School of Journalism. Highlights include a conversation on communication law set for 10:30 am at the Law Center, Room 129; a conversation with Oregon media people at 2 pm at Allen Hall, Room 211; and a meeting sponsored by the Society of Professional Journalists student chapter at 3:30 pm at Allen Hall, Room 307. The events are open to those interested.

On Thursday, April 7, from 7-9 pm a public reception will be held for Lewis at the Wayne Morse Ranch, 595 Crest Dr. in Eugene, sponsored by the Morse Ranch Association.

Lewis currently is a lecturer in law at Harvard Law School, and is considered an expert on the constitutional rights and duties of the press.

Hans Linde, who will join Lewis on Friday evening, was appointed to the Oregon Supreme Court in 1977 after 18 years on the UO law school faculty. A 1947 graduate of Reed College, he earned his law degree from the University of California at Berkeley. After serving as a clerk to Justice William O. Douglas at the U.S. Supreme Court, Linde worked for the U.S. State Department and as a legislative assistant to Oregon Sen. Richard L. Neuberger.

Linde is a widely recognized scholar on constitutional and legislative law.



Vandenburg Protest Continues

At least 10 Eugene residents are still being held in various detention facilities on charges of unlawful entry in connection with a large nuclear weapons protest at Vandenburg Air Force Base in California.

Close to 800 people were arrested for civil disobedience actions which began March 21 and continued for 3 days. It is believed to be the largest such demonstration ever to take place on federal property. This action was intended to prevent the further development and testing of the MX missile.

A similar protest involving civil-disobedience took place at Vandenburg AFB last January. In that action, protestors were detained and released within a short time with "Bann and Bar" notices. Participants in last week's action, however, are still being held pending arraignment on federal charges of unlawful entry.

A total of 12 Eugene residents were arrested, plus a Eugenean's 75-year-old grandfather from Santa Barbara. Two men have been released for medical rea-

sons and the others—5 men and 5 women—are lodged in detention facilities throughout California and Arizona. "Our" grandfather was released, and plans to return.

The Eugene participants are members of Eugene Direct Action, a group of more than fifty people, united in opposition to nuclear weapons. The group, professing a dedication to Gandhian-style non-violence, sponsors trainings in these principles.

Eugene Direct Action support people, presently at Vandenburg Air Force Base, report that 37 men in Lompoc detention center in California are on a hunger strike. At this time it is not clear what their demands are.

There are also unconfirmed reports that during Wednesday's protest one of the military policemen, who appeared to be influenced by the action, threw down his baton and joined the protestors. He was immediately arrested and is thought to be scheduled for court martial on Friday.
