## Festival of East European Peoples

The local community of Eugene-Springfield has the opportunity to participate in a unique event. The University of Oregon is hosting a Festival of East European Peoples from April 10-May 1. This series of public events celebrating the cultures of Eastern Europe, both in the Old World and in North America, is expected to draw participants from the entire West Coast.

Any community is enhanced by diversity among its members. People of Eastern European cultures comprise a portion of our local community and the foods, traditions and perspectives which they contribute add to our community's well-being.

Mark Levy, Outreach Coordinator for the Russian and East European Studies Center at the U of O, states: "Behind the current headlines of political turmoil in Poland, the Balkans, and other European countries, there are rich cultural heritages which we will be presenting. Personally, my main purpose in sponsoring this event is to get the local community really involved. People do not know much about East European peoples and this event is aimed at changing that. We're also excited at the possibility of people of East European heritage learning more themselves through these events."

The events will range from the award-winning Ukrainian film "Shadows of Forgotten Ancestors" and Yiddish films starring Molly Picon through folk-dance workshops, a traditional

Balkan-style lamb roast at Hendrick's Park, slide-lectures and panel discussions. Perhaps the centerpiece of the Festival can be considered the ongoing exhibit of Macedonian Bridal Costumes at the U of O Museum of Natural History, April 10-30. These rare 19th-century costumes, from Yugoslav Macedonia, Levy says, are "fantastic and must be seen to be believed. Additionally, people should be aware of the April 30th Concert of East European Folk Music which will be really great." It will feature traditional Bulgarian, Greek, Jewish Klezmer, Romanian, Ukrainian and Yugoslav instrumental and vocal music. All events throughout the festival are free with the exception of the dance and singing workshops, concert, parties and lamb roast which occur April 29-May 1.

The Festival is being sponsored by the local East European Folklife Center, the U of O Russian and East European Studies Center, the Oregon Committee for the Humanities, and others.
