Highlights

There will be a free public symposium on Freedom and Culture in the Soviet Union, April 18-23. Noted Russian humanist and sculptor Ernst Neizvestny will join five other authorities to discuss the reciprocal relationship between political freedom and cultural development in the Soviet Union. They will focus on the evolution of Soviet cinema under the aesthetics of "social realism." The UO symposium will include seven lectures, five films and numerous opportunities for discussion. See our calendar for the daily schedule. The UO Museum of Art invites you to an opening reception, 2-4 pm, April 17.

EARTH WEEK 1983, a student-sponsored series of events at the University, will feature films and lectures on environmental issues plus a "clean-up the Mill Race" campaign. This celebration, April 16-22, will host several noted authors and activists: Nick Allen, editor of *Diet for a Small Planet*, "soft energy" activists Amory and Hunter Lovins, Norman Solomon, investigative reporter, Ernest Callenbach, author of *Ectopria*, journalist Paul Loeb, and more.

Also featured will be the controversial film "Acid Rain from heaven," produced by the Canadian Film Board. This documentary, about toxic chemicals from U.S. steel plants mixing with rain to form an acidic solution, has been declared "foreign propaganda" and anyone showing this film must register with the Department of Justice!

There will also be a photography competition, the purpose of which is to compose a visual background of photographs to reinforce Earth Week. The prints will be judged on how well they relate to the theme as well as photographic merit.
