In Review

Chan Is Missing

Wayne Wang, Director. (USA 1981)

Chan Is Missing is zany, witty, political, enigmatic and just plain fun. Made by independent San Francisco filmmaker Wayne Wang in 16mm black and white, it has a refreshing home-made authenticity; all the characters seem to be playing themselves. The plot is a spoof on the Charlie Chan tradition of sleuth movies: a taxi-driver and his nephew search for the elusive Chan who's disappeared with the money they were going to use to buy their own cab. Their search leads them on a complete tour of Chinatown, through the back door—the missions, residential hotels, restaurants, and other hangouts for those still bewildered immigrants who haven't really assimilated the U.S. experience. In the process they uncover the divisions within their own community, from political quarrels (pro-Taiwan vs. People's Republic), to the generation gap, to the basic conflict between Chinese and American traditions.
