Arbor Day will be celebrated on Friday, April 29 beginning at 12 noon in Hendricks Park with a commemorative planting of a Red Oak tree. Joint Parks Committee member Marna Broekhoff will accept the award "Tree City U.S.A." on behalf of the city from Darrel Spiesschaert of the Dept. of Forestry. Ms. Broekhoff will then present the award to City Manager Mike Gleason to put up for public display in City Hall. This year marks the fourth consecutive year that Eugene has earned the "Tree City U.S.A." award sponsored by the National Arbor Day Foundation. To receive the award, a city must have a tree board or city department with statutory responsibility for developing and maintaining a tree program and must have adopted ordinances providing for tree planting, maintenance and removal. Eugene Parks and Recreation Dept. has a \$145,000 tree program.

Douglas Fir, Noble Fir, and Spruce seedlings will be distributed by the Eugene Parks and Recreation Dept. beginning April 25, in celebration of the 101st anniversary of Arbor Day. The seedlings, obtained for the U.S. Forest Service, will be available for 25¢, which is a handling fee for information on care and maintenance of the trees.

Seedlings will be picked up at Amazon, Westmoreland, Sheldon, Petersen Barn Community Centers, and Kaufman and Campbell Senior Centers during regular operating hours. Proceeds from the distribution will go toward the purchase of park and street trees for Eugene parks. Donations will also be accepted through May. A \$20 donation will purchase one tree for a city park. Contributions should be mailed to the Eugene Parks and Recreation Dept., Arbor Day Tree Fund, 858 Pearl Street, Eugene, OR 97401. Checks should be made payable to the City of Eugene.

The Annual LCC Friends of the Library Book Sale will be held May 3rd, 8-7:30 pm and May 4th and 5th from 8-5 pm. Proceeds will go towards purchase of new books for the LCC Library.

Under a new FCC ruling, non-profit organizations, along with individual listeners, will now have an opportunity to underwrite programs on KWAX-FM. This will allow non-profit groups such as churches, social services, and libraries the chance to promote special events, concerts, programs and services. In addition, individual listeners will have a chance to buy underwriting to commemorate birthdays, anniversaries, weddings, or even a favorite composer's birthday. But the real benefit of this new ruling is the added fundraising capacity it gives to public radio stations such as KWAX-FM. With the continued state and federal funding phase-out for public broadcasting, new sources of income must be found soon. Women's Resource Center

Did you come to Eugene expecting to find a Women's Center? Or have you been living here and feeling the need for a women's space? Even before the Women's Town Meeting in September, a group of women had been meeting for the purpose of creating a Women's Resource Center for the Eugene-Springfield community. Since that time more than 65 women have given their support and energy toward a realization of that goal.

The objective of the Women's Resource Center is to provide a supportive space where women can come together to foster women's autonomy, sisterhood, and liberation, encouraging diversity and giving support to women of various ages, sexual orientation, and physical ability and to various racial, ethnic, economic and spiritual groups. The center would provide resource referrals for a wide variety of activities, and would have space for workshops, cultural events, a library, day care center, as well as just a place for women to come together socially.

The Center's supporters have already sponsored several events and fundraising projects including a Women's Dance on International Women's Day. Ongoing now is a workshop to build Lesbian/Non-lesbian understanding with Lyn Marx and Vicki Koch. Coming up in May, on Friday the 13th, will be a Community Dance with that entertaining group, the Cashiers. It will be held at the Central Presbyterian Church Fellowship Hall, 1475 Ferry. Various workshops and events, including a women's poetry reading, are in the planning works, with a calendar of events to be out in June.
