Film

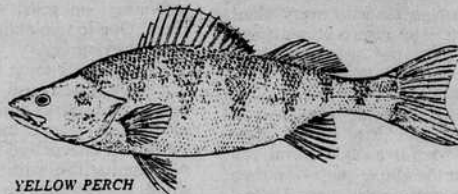

The Selfish Giant

The Children's Community Theater is producing **The Selfish Giant**, an original adaptation by Celeste Bennett of the Oscar Wilde fairy tale. The story is about some children playing in the giant's garden—until he discovers them and kicks them out. They are missed by the flowers, so the sunshine leaves. The north wind comes and the pigglings get very cold. Jack Frost comes, and so does Witchy Winter. The giant becomes filled with remorse and yearns for the children. Eventually they come back and are unaffected by the cold so Witchy Winter has to leave; spring returns and the flowers bloom again.

The cast of characters in this production are very special and unusual. There are about 15 children and five adults playing together. Included in the cast are a physically handicapped child, a senior citizen, and a giant who is on stilts throughout the play.

The Oregon Imagination Celebration '83 kicks off April 30 in Eugene with day-long events and activities to be held on the Downtown Mall.
