Arthur Macy Cox & Arms Control

Arthur Macy Cox spoke at the University last week as part of Ground Zero Week sponsored by Students for a Nuclear Free Future. He is a former U.S. arms negotiator with 38 years' experience in diplomacy, and was directly involved in the negotiations for the SALT II and test ban treaties.

Cox outlines the history of the arms race from the situation of US superiority over the USSR during the cold war in the 50's and 60's to the present situation where both countries have enough weapons that the race for greater numbers has become "meaningless." During the Cold War, the US used its advantage to threaten and coerce the Soviets (as for example in the Bay of Pigs); and Cox sees the Reagan administration's policies as an attempt to regain this kind of superiority through the use of highly sophisticated technology. But never again, he said, will this truly be possible, because the Russians have the ability to catch up with any new US developments—and in the meantime "technology is outstripping our ability to deal with it." The present situation he termed "an insane course"; and he sees the only safe alternative as a policy of deterrence, with each side having a stable arsenal of weapons sufficient for retaliation (though much smaller than at present)—and therefore, sufficient to prevent their use.

It was the threat of accidental war that Cox most strongly emphasized in discussing the projected US deployment of the Cruise and Pershing II missiles. The Soviets have stated their intention to go to a "launch on warning" system if these missiles are deployed, which would mean that they would fire back upon receiving computer warning, before finding out if the missiles had in fact been launched. The command and control system is the most fragile part of our weapons system, Cox said: in the last 18 months there were in this country three national nuclear alerts all based on false alarms caused by computer error. It takes time to discover these errors, approximately 15 minutes in the US communications system; and Soviet communications are considerably slower. With a warning time of only 6-8 minutes from launch to impact for the Pershing II missiles, the Rus-

sians would not have time to verify a warning—hence, their felt need to launch on warning.

Serious arms negotiations are imperative, Cox stressed. He calls the "zero option" and START proposals "cosmetic" because neither offers equality to the Soviet Union, and equality, in his view, is essential to stability. He pointed out that at a meeting of all former US ambassadors to the Soviet Union, they stressed unanimously that we must not put the USSR in a corner in arms negotiations. Cox favors a mutual and verifiable freeze on the development, deployment, and testing of all nuclear weapons. The testing ban he considers extremely important because all the sophisticated nuclear weapons require extensive testing before they will be usable. In answer to the frequent objection that the Soviets will never allow on-site inspection of their weapons sites, Cox pointed out that provisions for such inspection have already been negotiated in the test ban treaty worked out between the US, USSR, and Britain (and accepted by Britain and the USSR already, but not by the US); these provisions include seismic monitoring devices, a standing grievance committee to investigate any complaints of violations, and a three-nation inspection team which can go to the site of any alleged violation to check it out. Despite the urgency of reaching an arms limitation agreement, Cox seems hopeful that it could be negotiated quickly because so much of the necessary groundwork has been accomplished in previous arms negotiations. What is necessary this time is serious intent to reach an agreement before it is too late.
