Book Review

The River Why

By David James Duncan, Sierra Club Books, San Francisco, CA, 1983. 294 pages, \$12.95. (Book courtesy of MARKETPLACE BOOKS, Fifth Street Market, Eugene.)

This is the first novel by Oregonian David Duncan. Though the story takes place in Oregon, it is not about Oregon.

This is the story of Gus Orviston, the son of a fly fishing father and a bait fishing mother. Raised amidst the storm of continual controversy between the two views, Gus became a consummate practitioner of both those arts.

Born to fishing, he was consumed by it; he ate, slept, dreamed and daydreamed fishing from his earliest days.

After graduating from high school, he fled from the stormy home front to the peaceful solitude of a cabin on the banks of a river on the Oregon coast. His only regret at leaving home was leaving behind his younger brother, Bill-Bob, who hated fishing as much as Gus loved it.

Gus was seeking the perfect life, a life that would revolve around fishing to the exclusion of everything else. Alone on the river he discovered much more than fishing.

He found new friends, one of them a salmon. He met a very special girl under very unusual circumstances and when all was said and done, he may have found himself.

Author Duncan's vivid descriptions do justice to the lush vegetation of the Oregon coast. His portrayal of a young man seeking fulfillment from life is told with warmth and humor. This novel is much more than just a story about fishing.
