At The Movies

Waiting for Love

Directed by Pytor Todorovsky (USSR, 1981).

Waiting for Love, which is filmed in the Russian port city of Odessa, opens with the feeling of a Parisian comedy. The camera darts with the motion of a car careening through gracious tree-lined streets, streetcars roll past, the people are dressed stylishly and laugh a lot. Rita (Ludmila Gurchenko) is going down to city hall to get married. She clowns and dimples her way through an impromptu photo session and enchants her family with her romantic anticipation of life with her second husband.

From such a beginning only the unexpected can come. As we wait with Rita for her fiancée Gavrilov, the lazy Odessa day in its perpetually long shadows stretches and curls like a dream. The city life around her park bench provides appropriately surrealistic touches. Waves of brides in white gowns succeed each other on the steps of City Hall. Instant queues form and wind behind someone—anyone—hauling imported items for sale; our distracted Rita is swept along and emerges weighted down by an enormous Japanese basin. Gurchenko's humor and her beautifully mobile face give her character the grace to dance through even this emotional day of dashed expectations. As a 38-year-old photo technician, Rita has a maturity that balances well her loony spontaneity.

Yet this is also one of those movies that is recast in the memory by its ending, the film in a sudden monotone, words spoken soundlessly between kisses delivered through a pane of glass, police cars. I wonder what else **Waiting for Love** would have meant to me if I had known more about Soviet society. But even in my ignorance I found it delightful and intriguing.
