B. Dalton Bookseller will sponsor **Oregon Literacy Day**, Thursday, Oct. 13, in all of its Oregon locations. Twenty percent of all designated register proceeds will be donated to Oregon Literacy, Inc. In Eugene, the money will go directly to the Eugene-Springfield Literacy Council, 650 W. 12th, to assist with projected operational expenses for the 1983-84 fiscal year.

Storyteller Godfrey Warner will perform for literacy at the Eugene B. Dalton on the downtown mall (194 W. Broadway, 683-6326) from 2-2:30 p.m. All ages are invited to enjoy this half-hour of imagination and adventure.

Functional illiteracy plagues 21.5% of Oregon's adult population; 5000 live in Lane County. The Eugene-Springfield Literacy Council, with the help of volunteer tutors, works on a one-to-

one basis with those who want to learn to read and write. Many students are learning English as a second language. Lessons are free. If you like to read, you can teach another. Volunteers receive twelve hours of intensive training in the Laubach teaching method. Training workshops will be held October 21, 22, and 29 for teaching English As A Second Language; and November 5, and 12 for Basic Training. A fee of \$6 is charged to cover the cost of tutoring materials.

Lessons are held at a mutually convenient time and place, often at the home of the student or teacher. Public meeting places are also available. Two hours per week is the minimum for success.
