Summit Awareness Week

On November 19, President Reagan and Soviet Leader Gorbachov will meet in Geneva for their long-awaited summit. The most pressing issue on the agenda of the two superpower leaders will be reducing the risk of nuclear war.

The awarding of the 1985 Nobel Peace Prize last month to the International Physicians for the Prevention of Nuclear War, a group founded five years ago by three American and three Russian physicians, helped to focus attention on international public concern about the arms race.

Physicians for Social Responsibility, the American branch of IP-PNW, has joined with other national organizations—FREEZE, SANE and WAND, the group founded by Dr. Helen Caldicott, in a campaign of public pressure for substantive summit results. Locally, a number of peace and justice groups have joined forces in Citizens for a Meaningful Summit to promote public awareness about the Geneva Summit.

Local Activities

Local summit awareness activities will begin Nov. 15 with a performance by the Atomic Comics, a San Francisco-based comedy duo who have been performing nuclear and political humor since 1980. The performance will be at 7:30 pm at the Erb Memorial Union on the U of O campus. Tickets (\$3.50 students/\$4.50 general public) are available at the EMU Main Desk.

Several area schools will focus on the Geneva Summit the week of Nov. 12-15. The local chapter of Educators for Social Responsibility is planning activities on the theme of "Finding Common Ground." For more information, call 484-1150.

Community Access Cable 11 TV will broadcast a special nationwide video conference produced by the Union of Concerned Scientists on November 18 from 8-10 pm. The program will be repeated on November 22 from 7-9 pm.

The video conference, called "From Trinity to Star Wars," will feature a panel discussion of technological trends contributing to international instability, factors which heighten the risk of nuclear war and measures that could reduce the risk. Panelists will include Dr. Paul Bracken, author of *Command and Control of Nuclear Forces*; Ambassador Jonathan Dean, head of the US delegation to the NATO-Warsaw Pact Force Reduction Negotiations, 1978-81; Senator Albert Gore Jr. of Tennessee; and Dr. Henry Kendall, professor of Physics at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. The program will also feature an interview with Former Defense Secretary Robert McNamara.

Candlelight Vigil

On the evening of November 19, local residents will have an opportunity to participate in one of numerous candlelight vigils being held throughout the country and

the world to mark the opening of the Geneva Summit. It will be held from 6-8:30 pm at the Saturday Market Park, 8th and Oak, or indoors at Harris Hall, in case of bad weather. Speakers will include County Commissioner Peter DeFazio, City Councillor Cynthia Wooten and Sister Evelyn of Sponsors, Inc. Members of the Eugene Peace Choir will sing.

Issues of the arms race will be the focus of a Summit Symposium planned for the evening of Nov. 20 at the University of Oregon EMU Forum Room. Speakers will include Sally Douglas, PhD, professor of Computer Science; Steve Johnson, military analyst for Decision Research; Patricia Gwartyne-gibbs, PhD, professor of Sociology; and Dr. Michael Weinstein of Physicians for Social Responsibility. The program will begin at 7:30 pm.

Films and information about direct action on apartheid and nuclear issues will be presented at Beyond the Summit: Grass Roots Action for Peace and Justice, a program at Harris Hall at 7 pm on Nov. 21. Films will include the classic documentary, *Lovejoy's Nuclear War*, and *South Africa & The Nuclear File*.

Summit events are all free and open to the public. Sponsoring organizations are Bah'ai Faith, Clergy and Laity Concerned, Citizens for Lasting Security, Educators for Social Responsibility, Eugene Friends Meeting, Families for Survival, New Call for Peacemaking, Physicians for Social Responsibility, South Eugene Peace Club, University Arms Control Forum, UO Students' Campaign for Disarmament and Women's Action for Nuclear Disarmament.

Berkeley Mayor speaks

Berkeley Mayor Eugene "Gus" Newport is one of the most unique public officials in the U.S. today. His experiences and scope of participation in the social movements of the last two decades make him particularly capable of chronicling the development of Black political thought and activity, as well as the substantive philosophical shifts and changes as regards to economic development, job development and the changing role of the federal government in relation to local municipalities. His unique contributions in the areas of coalition building and the fight for peace, as well as his experiences as the dynamic mayor of the innovative city of Berkeley makes him an important speaker on the pressing issues of our time.

An internationally known advocate of peace, Newport is now leading the fight against gentrification, for housing development and the civil rights of minorities and the disabled in what is nationally recognized as one of the most creative and important municipal experiments in the history of local government.

The Mayor will speak on Monday, Nov. 11, at 7:30 pm in Room

He will also join CALC's (Clergy & Laity concerned) annual meeting and speak on "A Mayor's Account of U.S. Foreign Policy and Its Effect on Community Life." The public is welcome. It takes place at Bethel Temple COGIC, 1545 S. Brooklyn St., Glenwood, from 4-6:30 pm, on Sunday.
