New on KLCC

Sundays with Susan Stamberg

Susan Stamberg wants you to spend Sunday mornings with her.

"We'll have a piano live in the studio and maybe a bass," says Stamborg. "But, we'll go about our business quietly, peacefully. Maybe you'll listen over your Sunday paper. We want you to hear the coffee brewing."

Weekend Edition with Susan Stamborg debuts on National Public Radio member station KLCC 89.7 FM on January 18 at 6 am.

Hosted by NPR's Susan Stamborg, for 14 years the co-host of All Things Considered, the two-hour Sunday morning program completes the system's goal of providing a news presence on public radio seven mornings and seven afternoons a week.

Sunday morning Weekend Edition

with Susan Stamborg, like its Saturday morning counterpart with Scott Simon, will be about the American weekend. But Stamborg says, "If Saturday is a day to run out and do errands, Sunday is a day to rest."

"On Sunday mornings, we hope you'll keep the radio going like your pot of coffee. We want to be a pleasant and informative companion. Nothing too intense. Cook your breakfast to us, go about your Sunday routine . . . we'll spend the morning with you."

During the course of any given program, Stamborg expects to talk with students, teachers, writers, musicians, mothers, fathers, newsmakers, filmmakers, critics, thinkers, travellers, collectors, cooks, car mechanics, religious leaders, and fad followers.

Weekend Edition on Sunday morning, says Stamborg, "will combine the style and substance of the *New York Times* 'Arts & Leisure' section with the intimacy and spontaneity of the old Arthur Godfrey Show. Informative, newsy, a little off-beat, a little spontaneous."

"This program will put an ear to the future," says Stamborg. "It will be about work in progress. You'll be in on things as they develop rather than after they're completed. We'll hear the symphony in rehearsal, not performance; talk to the director as he shoots his movie, not once it's in the theater; and hear readings from the new novel as the author rips Chapter Two from the typewriter."

"Expect live music, listener participation, and a small group of weekly regulars engaged in lively, intelligent conversation."

Stamborg is the winner of many major awards in broadcast journalism. She is the first woman to anchor a national nightly news program in the United States. In her 14 years on NPR's All Things Considered, she became one of public radio's most respected journalists.

Stamborg is ready for the challenge of Sunday mornings. She says she is ready for a new beginning. A relaxed new beginning. Time to consider a few things instead of all things. Like the time spent at home on a Sunday, a Sunday with Susan Stamborg.

Local and regional news will be covered by KLCC's Dave Henry. Dave is also co-host of Saturday's Weekend Edition.
