Protest changes to celebration

A "Die-In" planned to protest Lane County's participation in the Nuclear Drill requested by the Reagan Administration has turned into a "celebration of life and a commitment to end the arms race."

It will take place at the Federal Building in downtown Eugene on Thursday, March 5 from 11:30 am-1:30 pm. Kitov will provide music, and Dr. Sarah Hendrickson (Physicians for Social Responsibility), Paul Olum (UO President) and Tom Heger (U.O. Chaplain, 4-J School Board) will speak.

Every Oregon County except Lane and Coos had voted not to participate in the FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) drill when Governor Goldschmidt decided "the concept of a survivable nuclear war is unacceptable," and the whole state of Oregon would not participate in the mock nuclear attack exercise.

The preparation for such drills has been protested nationwide and the folly of trying to deal with "disaster scenarios" is becoming more and more clear to Americans daily.

It is the hope of the celebration organizers that Eugonians will affirm their commitment to peace by showing up in numbers at the Federal building Thursday.

In 1985-86 shelter was provided to 611 women and children and over 5,500 crisis calls were handled on the 24 hr. crisis line.

The Portland branch of the nationwide Hands Across America Organization found that battered women comprise the second largest group of homeless in the metropolitan area. Statistical information still being collected may well show this to be a statewide phenomenon.

Study finds airport OK

A Eugene city funded feasibility study for the development of the Riverfront Research Park has found air transportation to be "more than adequate for the majority of firms" and from a "passenger perspective." The recently released study was conducted by the Battelle Corporation of Columbus, Ohio.

The study seems to conflict with the city's contentions in its attempts to have voters approve a \$5.83 million bond levy on March 31. The bonds would be paid over a 20 year period. City officials have been vague concerning funding sources for the repayment of the bond. However, the last sentence of the city's explanatory pamphlet states that "voters should be aware that passage of the levy does allow the city to levy an additional property tax" to repay the bonds.

The Battelle Study states that "the pattern of service from Eugene is entirely satisfactory" and further adds that "fixed base operations are good." The study which cost the city approximately \$30,000 has been little publicized by the city.



Lap-a-thon to benefit Womenspace

Womenspace is Lane County's shelter for battered women and their dependent children. The eighth annual Womenspace Lap-a-thon will be held on Sat., Feb. 28 at eight participating pools.

"It is an important event for everyone who believes in the work of Womenspace because it is the major fundraiser," says Anne Tryk, Womenspace director.

"There is another role that the Lap-a-thon plays that is very important. Every year a lot of people hear about Womenspace for the first time because of it," Tryk said. "Later, they may need our services, or may be interested in volunteering, or wanting to support us financially."

People in the community can actively support Womenspace by swimming at one of the community pools and by getting their friends, families, and co-workers to sponsor them. The participating pools are River Road, YMCA, Easter Seal, Sheldon, Echo Hollow, Willamalane, University of Oregon Pools and the Downtown Athletic Club for members. Those interested in swimming for the Lap-a-thon may pick up informational packets at the respective pools.

Broadway Improvement Project

(The City of Eugene provided the following to let people know just exactly what changes are taking place on the mall between Charnelton and Willamette Streets.)

The Broadway Improvement Project is the renovation of the two blocks of Broadway between Charnelton and Willamette. The goal of the project is to improve the mall as an environment for retail and other business, while retaining the pleasant pedestrian atmosphere. This will be done by removing physical and visual obstructions, improving security by opening up sight lines and installing lights, and replacing the 15-year-old street furniture and other amenities. The project does not involve opening this part of the mall to vehicular traffic. Project elements include:

- Removal of structures, including restrooms and existing play structure;
- Installation of eighteen 5-globe classic-style pedestrian light fixtures with street signs and banner brackets;
- Removal of some existing trees and planting of some new trees to realign them in a tradition street tree pattern;
- Smaller, more open play area;
- New benches, litter receptacles, landscape planters, flower pots, litter receptacles, bike bollards and public phones;
- Moveable cafe tables, chairs and umbrellas;
- Revamped and expanded electrical system.

The total project cost is \$658,400. The project is funded with Tax Allocation dollars. The Tax Allocation Fund is property tax revenue that comes from increases in assessed valuation in the downtown district. The fund may only be spent on projects within the district.

The project is scheduled to be substantially complete by the end of May. This means the fences should be down, the lights installed, and the concrete and brick
