Eugene's Nuclear Free Zone One Year Later

A year ago this month, Eugene voters decided 24,153 to 17,065 in favor of making the city a nuclear free zone. The ordinance has yet to be enacted, and only a few of its provisions have been carried out. A year of politics and negotiations is winding to a close. What has taken so long? What the hell is going on?

What Went Before

The ordinance was created and put on the ballot by Political Action for Lasting Security (PALS), the lobbying arm of Citizens Action for Lasting Security (CALS). Even before the election, the City Council noted many possible problems with it, and voted to recommend against the ordinance by a 5-4 margin, with Mayor Brian Obie tipping the scales.

Despite the Council's recommendation and opposition from *The Register-Guard's* editorialists, it was passed by a large majority in last year's general election. After the election, city attorneys reported several potential legal problems to the City Council; they in turn acknowledged that the city is a Nuclear Free Zone (NFZ), but decided to delay implementation of the ordinance until legal questions could be ironed out. That's why they created the NFZ Task Force.

The Task Force

The task force was appointed by Mayor Obie along with Councilpersons Freeman Holmer and Ruth Bascom. Some people, like Task Force member and local lawyer Nancy Willard, believe that the council "bent over backwards" to choose representatives from each part of the community, and point out that the process was open to the public. Some others, like CALS worker and Task Force member David Zupan, feel that the process was "arbitrary" and the group was "stacked" in favor of the business community.

One member in particular, Robert Ellis, drew attention because he owns

a high-tech firm that handles defense contracts. While some complained of conflict-of-interest, Ellis feels there is equal conflict in having peace activists on the committee.

"We are all in some respects committed to peace," says task force chair

Others feel it was riddled with problems. Willard thinks it was too vague, and was tantamount to banning the entire defense establishment.

Some of this disagreement is evident in how members of the task force feel about their work.

Down to Business

The city attorneys presented a memo last December to the City Council outlining potential problems with the NFZ ordinance, including conflict with state law, conflict with federal law, and more. Particularly unclear were articles that prohibited generation of nuclear power, transport or storage of waste, and waste disposal, according to city attorney Tim Sercombe. He believes the original ordinance was "terrible in terms of clarity."

It was the job of the task force to rewrite it, addressing the legal questions.

Zupan feels that the only flaw in the original ordinance was a simple mistake about the date of the general election at which time the NFZ Board was to be chosen by the voters.

The Ordinances

There are currently four official versions of the NFZ ordinance: The original version, which is generally out of the running but is used for comparison purposes; Majority version "A"; Compromise version "B";
