

CHEMAWA WINS PRIZES

WE MADE A GREAT SHOWING AT THE FAIR

Oregon is taking steps to advance agriculture by interesting children in the cultivation of the soil by creating a fund and offering prizes for the best productions of a few standard crops. Oregon is also encouraging domestic art and science by offering prizes for several of the best productions of handicraft. Mr. L. R. Alderman, Superintendent of Public Instruction, and Mr. W. M. Smith, are to be complimented on the success that crown their efforts in this first "State Industrial Contest" and "Marion County School Fair."

Many of the counties and a few of the cities of the state have held industrial fairs for their school children. The interest taken by citizens and parents in this form of industrial education is evidenced by their response with livestock, poultry, and manufactured articles for first prizes, and money for second, third, fourth and fifth prizes.

A number of the pupils of the Salem Indian School entered the contest in the Marion County, and Oregon State Industrial Fair, and all but one was rewarded by the receipt of prizes.

Marie Shaishnikoff took second place in the contest in hand-made aprons. The prize was a check of \$6.00 given by the Oregon State Fair. She has received no notice as to her county prize on the apron. She is entitled to second prize, at least, in Marion County.

Lizzie Dahl exhibited a machine-made apron. She took third place in her class and was rewarded with a check for \$5.00 given by the State Fair. On this apron she was given second place in the Marion County exhibit and received a check for three dollars, making a total of \$8.00 for her efforts.

Colista Rainville took the fourth prize of \$4.00 in the exhibit of machine-made aprons in the state contest, and the third prize of \$2.00 in the county contest, totaling \$6.00 for her.

Julia Gromoff showed her skill in mending stockings. She carried off the first prize in three-piece darning in both state and county. The prizes consist of a trio of purebred Anconas given by R. Woolry, Salem, and a trio of White Leghorns given by John Habacek, Liberty. This will give Julia a good start in the chicken business.

Xenia Bester followed close after Julia by capturing second prize in darning. Her checks total \$9.00, \$6.00 from state, and \$3.00 from the county.

Clara Williams did not follow Xenia in the state contest in darning. Clara took fifth place, receiving a check for \$3.00, but she took third place in the county exhibit, receiving a check for \$2.00, giving her a total of \$5.00.

Laura Siddle put a dress on exhibit, but received no prize. The work on this dress is a credit to the girl, however. Laura is not disheartened by defeat. She will show the girls at the next contest that improvements can be made in one's dressmaking.
