

one-half pounds of grain in the morning, and the same amount at noon, and in the evening give him six pounds of hay, three pounds of grain, and (during winter and spring) four good-size carrots.

The horses should be curried or cleaned twice a day, and spend enough time in doing so. (With currycomb and brush in hand, let your horse know of your presence by making some remark to him as you approach his left, as, "Stand over, Don." Never approach a horse's stall unless you are sure that he knows that you are coming. The unexpected frightens horses as well as people. Commence the job of combing and brushing at the horse's head. Use no more pressure upon the comb than is necessary to remove the dirt from the hair and skin. The horse will be uneasy and move about if you do not properly handle the comb. Proceed with a system, cleaning thoroughly as you go along from head to foot. Do all talking to the horse in a low tone. Pass around the rear of the horse to his right side, place your hand upon him and ask him to move to the other side of the stall. Commence at his head again and clean his right side).
