

And some one would say, "We are on a sand bar". I got out of bed and went out to see what was the matter and found that we were on a sand bar and that the boat had to stay there for six days. When daylight came the wind began to blow hard. While we were at breakfast the First Mate came into the diningroom and said that the passengers would have to go ashore, which was about 200 yards off from the boat. When he said that, my sister quit eating and I think she was frightened. I did not get frightened because I could swim that far.

After breakfast we got ready to go ashore; they put us in a small boat with four seaman and the second mate; then we left the ship. When we got ashore we were very wet; I did not care much about myself, but I did care about my sister. We slept ashore that night, then the next morning they took us thirty miles south of where we were wrecked; the name of the place is Ketchikan, Alaska.

We stayed in Ketchikan six days; on the evening of the sixth day we left for Seattle on the same boat on which we were wrecked, the tide having floated it off the sand bar.

Sunday, February 3, at four o'clock, we reached Seattle, and the next day we were at Chemawa. It took twenty-one days to come from Kodiak, Alaska, to Chemawa, and I tell you friends I was glad to settle down and to know that sister was safe.—Micheal McLeod, Junior Class; Keni Tribe.
