RELIANCE-EXCELSIOR DEBATE

One of the most exciting as well as interesting events in the history of the school year was the annual debate between the Reliance and Excelsior Literary Societies, which occurred Thursday evening, Apr. 3, in the auditorium. For several years there has been a spirit of friendly rivalry existing between the two societies, both in debates and athletics. The Reliance has defeated the Excelsior at basketball and football this school year, and on Thursday evening won the annual debate, thus adding one more to their unbroken line of victories for several years.

The team representing the Reliance Society, Martin Sampson principal, Frank Verigan and Loulin Brewer colleagues, upheld the affirmative side of the question, "Resolved, That the United States is justified, without violating the provisions of the Hay-Pauncefote Treaty, in making rebates of tolls charged for passage through the Panama Canal to owners of American vessels engaged in the coast-wise trade." The negative side of the question was defended by Harry Jones, principal, Patsie Barrett and Patrick Verney colleagues, of the Excelsior Society.

The question was given to the two teams on Wednesday, which meant hard work for both sides, in order to present their arguments the following evening. Both sides worked hard on the question, as was shown by their arguments. The judges who decided in favor of the affirmative were Mr. Scott Principal of the Highland School in Salem, Miss Guthrie of the Highland School, and Mr. Miller of Portland.

One pleasing feature of these debates is the way in which Superintendent Wadsworth presides as chairman of the evening. The different societies of the school have chosen him as their permanent chairman in the public debates, which take place from time to time.

After the debate the judges, different members of the debating teams and their girl friends, and a few invited guests enjoyed the hospitality of Mrs. Brewer and Miss Skipton, who served refreshments.
