TWO GREAT MEMORIALS

Just south of the White House, in Potomac Park, a beautiful and fitting memorial is to be erected to the memory of Abraham Lincoln. In February congress appropriated \$2,000,000 for this purpose. The plans are all completed and the work will soon be begun, so that the national capital will have a fitting memorial to our martyr president.

This memorial is to be built on a slight eminence, in the form of a beautiful Greek temple, the material throughout being white marble. A flight of broad and graceful steps will lead up to the temple.

All our nation honors this great man and we, too, are interested in it; but let me tell you of another memorial being erected that is of as great interest to us, as Indian boys and girls, that is, the great memorial statue that will stand on the Atlantic coast. Almost the last thing that President Taft did before leaving office was to turn the first spadeful of earth on the ground where it is to stand on top of a hill at Ft. Wadsworth, at the entrance to New York harbor, as he stood beside a group of Indian Chiefs clad in all their native costumes.
