The piggery covers an area of about five acres, and is divided into ten sections with a sty in each. Seven of the pens are six by eight feet, front wall five feet and rear wall three feet high, with a shanty roof. The lower three feet of the front is open and faces east. The other three sheds are six by twelve feet. They are cheap structures, yet comfortable and durable. The most of them were made from odds and ends.
