"INDIAN HENRY"

The following dispatch from Pendleton, Or., appeared in the Oregon Journal recently on the death of "The Last of the Mollas:"

That Chief Yelkis, known as "Indian Henry," the last of the Molallas, whose body was found this week near Molalla, was really the last of one branch of the Cayuse tribe, is the statement of Major Lee Moorhouse, local historian, who holds that all northwest ethnologists will concur in the statement.

The Molallas, instead of being an individual tribe, were really an offshoot of the Cayuse tribe now living upon the Umatilla reservation, he says, and are the only Indians who perserved the old Cayuse tongue in its purity.

"Many years ago," said the major in speaking of the death of the old Indian, "the Cayuses and Snakes fought a bloody battle near the present site of the town of Umatilla. The Snakes were victorious and scattered their enemies. One band headed west with the Snakes in pursuit, and the chase continued until the fugitives were across the Cas-
