

to the place and throw stones on the steep hillside to find out how many more years they have to live.

On the island there is also a big rock that rings like a bell when it is struck with a stone. the Indians call that rock the Crow's Bell. Many years ago there were no people living on Forrester Island. The island is so steep and high all around that there is no place to have a home. About five or six years ago they found Forrester Island to be a rich island for King salmon fishing. Three or four hundred men live on the island during the fishing season. When I was there last spring there were so many King salmon that the fish buyers spent five thousand dollars in three days buying the salmon. Staying on the island is more like staying on a ship in the ocean.

It is hard for the white people to make a landing there in stormy weather for the waves are so big that when they try to land on the shore they are sure to tip over, but Indians know how to manage the waves and know how to land on them to get ashore safely. There is a strong current that runs into the main land and out so when the wind starts to blow the waves come up quickly.

Now, the government has a man out there every fishing season to take charge of affairs on the Island, and to take care of the birds and their eggs. This year they will not let any power or gas boats fish out there because the smell of the gas kills the birds.—GEORGE ROBERTS, Fifth Grade.
