MAY 29th Chemawa easily defeated the Salem Y. M. C. A. track team on the local field, 84 to 53. While the meet was rather slow some good marks were made by both teams. Some of the records are as follows: Ford, Salem, won the 100-yard dash, time 10:1; Jim, Chemawa, won the mile run, time 4:37; Sellev, Chemawa, won the 220-yard dash, time, 22:1-5; R. Service, Chemawa, pole vault, 10 feet; Eder, Chemawa, javelin, 143:4"; Flint, Salem, 440-yard dash, time 52:1; Adams, Chemawa, broad jump, 20:10;" Chemawa easily won the one and four mile relay races.

June 22nd the Senior Class won the class day championship of the school. R. Service, senior, was the star point winner of the day; he made 24 of the 56 points scored by his team. The Junior Class failed to make a point; 7th grade, 42; 6th grade, 4 points; 5th grade, 14 points.
