This reservation is on Puget Sound, in the state of Washington, and is a part of the Tulalip reserve, being under the jurisdiction of Dr. Chas. M. Buchanan. From reports to reach us the fair was a great success. From an exchange we make the following reprint:

In the schoolhouse on the Lummi Indian reservation Saturday, the second annual fair was held and well attended.

While the exhibits were not large, they were of most creditable character and clearly indicate the advancement which the Lummi Indians are making industrially and agriculturally.

The exhibits were under the direction of a committee composed of William McClusky, George Boone, Thomas Jefferson, Peter James, Solomon Balch and Angel Jefferson. This committee proposes to make of the Lummi fair an annual event and next year to have an extensive program and a list of premiums such as will attract more exhibits and a larger attendance.
