In a sense this school will provide for aspiring Indian youths what Booker T. Washington and his great Tuskegee school is doing for the negro people.

It will certainly prove a splendid aid for higher education and should be fostered and encouraged in every way possible. Many noted philanthropists of wealth are interested and will assist in financing the undertaking. What shall be the terms of entrance when the school is finally opened we have not the slightest idea, but we trust that some day Chemawa may have representatives in the Wichita school who shall eventually prove themselves a credit to both institutions.
