CLEANING THE ROW

If the fence row is lined with dead grass and weeds, burn them the first dry sunny day. Scatter the fire with a garden rake filled with burning grass collected as you drag it along. If the fence row contains brush, grub them out. Having thus cleaned the fence row of rubbish, we are ready for the assistance of horses and plow. Hitch to the plow with a short evener and short single-trees. Plow the field borders away from the fences. By proper adjustment of the plow, much of the labor can be done with two horses. Finish the plowing with one horse. By putting the draft in the last hole to the right of the side clevis you will be able to plow to within a few inches of the fence. Finish the job by using mattock, garden rake, and spade.

CROPS FOR FENCE-ROWS

Whether the crop is to be one of beauty, or one of utility, will depend on the location of the fence. The fence along the walk to the electric line, will be occupied by one of beauty—mixed varieties of sweet peas. Pupils and visitors are welcomed to bouquets of this crop, as continued flowering depends on their blossoms being cut. Please remember to cut the stems, do not pick or pull them off, as that will break and injure the vines.

The lane fences will be occupied by crops that stock will not nip in passing, such as tomatoes and cucumbers. The other fences should be occupied in trellising some tall growing garden peas, such as the Improved Telephone, Champion of England, and White Marrowfat.

Use the fence-rows for crops that need trellising to produce quality and quantity. The fence is there. You do not have to go to the expense of building special trellises. Cultivating the crops along fences keeps down the weed nuisance and will give returns above the expense of cultivation. All readers of this article are implored to give fence-row cultivation a trial this season. School farmers, gardeners, and dairymen can wonderfully improve the school's general appearance if they will co-operate in this work and utilize the fence-rows adjoining the land worked by them.
