

AN EXCHANGE

For the past year or two the health of Mrs. Wadsworth has been very poor, especially in the winter season—so poor, in fact, as to cause considerable apprehension. Recently, on the advice of the doctor, who urged that she be taken to a southern climate, Supt. Wadsworth, with the consent of the Indian Office, effected an exchange of positions with Supt. Hall of San Jacinto, California. By this exchange Supt. Wadsworth will have the superintendency of about a dozen Mission Indian reservations in Santa Barbara, Los Angeles and San Diego counties, while Supt. Hall will take charge at Chemawa. Each will assume charge in his new field on July 1st. Supt. Wadsworth has already taken his departure from Chemawa and Supt. Hall is, at this writing, expected soon.

Supt. Wadsworth has the satisfaction of having inaugurated many improvements at Chemawa—too numerous to attempt mentioning at this time. He has many warm friends who regret his departure and who will ever remember him with feelings most kindly, and will hope him only good luck in his new field of endeavor. Mrs. Wadsworth, too, has numerous friends here who sympathize with her in her distressing state of health. She is still here at present under the care of Dr. Burgess, but hopes soon to depart for the south. Her daughter, Miss Agnes, is here with her.

It is a pleasure in this connection to extend a welcome to Supt. and Mrs. Harwood Hall, who are soon to be established at this school. Both may be sure of a cordial welcome from us all, who are to co-operate with Supt. Hall, as we have with Supt. Wadsworth in the past, and we trust that they in turn may like Chemawa and her people.

TUBERCULOSIS MOVEMENT

Statistics made public today by The National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis show that nearly 3,000 agencies are now listed in the fight against tuberculosis in the United States, an increase of 1600 per cent, since 1904, when the national warfare on this disease was started. These figures are taken from a new tuberculosis directory just issued by the Association.

The list includes 557 sanatoria and hospitals, 158 tuberculosis boarding houses, 90 hospitals for the insane and 35 penal institutions making special provision for tuberculosis, 455 dispensaries, 310 open air schools, and 1324 anti-tuberculosis associations and committees. To these are added 158 Canadian institutions and associations, making
