

**FOOTBALL**

About 100 Chemawa students and employes accompanied the football team to Mt. Angel on Saturday to witness the game between Chemawa and Mt. Angel College. The gridiron was very muddy, which was a handicap to the Indian team which was lighter than their opponents, depending more upon quickness and speed than upon weight. During the first two periods of the game Chemawa outplayed the Mt. Angel team and were several times near scoring, but were penalized at various times during this period for off-side play, which prevented a score.

Tatshama made the most sensational run of the day for a gain of fifty yards upon a delayed pass. The second half Mt. Angel seemed to have the better of it and were at two different times near to a touch down. The Indians tried one field goal and Mt. Angel two, one of which was successful, thus winning the game by 3 points.

Chamberlain made a long run for a touch down which was disallowed on account of an off-side play by Chemawa. Colby played his end position well, smashing the Mt. Angel interference on plays directed at his side of the line. Elk played a good defensive game, but his passing at times was poor owing to the mud sticking to the ball. Eder's punting was better than that of the opposing team, while Lapps at tackle played an especially good game. Nix was substituted for Edenshaw during the third quarter. Downie used good judgment in selection of plays except in one instance where he attempted to advance the ball on 4th down on midfield and lost it on downs. Chemawa as a whole played a good game, particularly in the first half, and on a dry field it is thought would have won the game.

Much school spirit was shown by the Chemawa rooters who enjoyed the day regardless of the rain and mud.
