REPORT ON CHEMAWA INSTITUTE

The practical daily health talks by Dr. Ferdinand Shoemaker, Assistant Medical Supervisor, on Hygiene and Sanitation, many of which were well illustrated with a series of lantern slides from photographs taken under service conditions, were well developed and well presented, and the courses in Penmanship, Arithmetic and English, conducted by Mr. C. E. Birch, Principal of Haskell Institute; Reading conducted by Miss Nellie E. Turner, Instructor, Pennsylvania State Normal School; Library Methods by Mrs. San Brace, Instructor, Salem Indian School; Primary Methods, by Mrs. Hattie Garber, Instructor, Euchree Boarding School, and Mrs. Dora E. Pendergrass, Instructor, Salem Indian School; Physical Training, by Mr. M. L. Clevett, Physical Director, Carlisle Indian School; Music, Orchestral, by Mr. Ruthyn Turney, Salem Indian School; Band, by Mr. Ira S. Loos, Vocal, by Mrs. Jeannette McCrosson, Instructors, Salem Indian School; Domestic Art, by Miss June H. Seeley, Extension Service, Oregon Agricultural College; Lace Making, by Mrs. Ellen Lawrence, Lace Teacher, Soboba Indian School; Domestic Science, by Miss Bertha Davis, Extension Service, Oregon Agricultural College; Embroidery, by Mrs. Eva B. Loos, Salem Indian School; Drafting, by Mr. John H. Eastman, Instructor in Mechanical Drawing and Woodwork, Salem Indian School; Farm Carpentry and Masonry, by Charles H. Woods, Instructor, Salem Indian School; Farm Blacksmithing, by Mr. H. E. Mann, Instructor, Salem Indian School; and lectures on Poultry, by Prof. C. C. Lamb, Extension Service, Oregon Agricultural College; Horticulture, by Prof. W. S. Brown, Extension Service, Oregon Agricultural College; Agronomy, by Prof. Ruzek, Extension Service, Oregon Agricultural College; Dairying, by Prof. Magnuss, Extension Service, Oregon Agricultural College; Boys' and Girls' Club Work, by Prof. H. C. Seymour, Extension Service, Oregon Agricultural College; and a most practical canning demonstration, conducted by Mr. Luther J. Chapin, of Salem, formerly County Agriculturist Marion County, Oregon, were very successfully carried out.

The evening lectures in the auditorium were largely attended by both the members of the Institute and the pupils of the Salem Indian School and the Institute in addition to being honored by the eloquent and very able address by Hon. Cato Sells, Commissioner of Indian Affairs, on Friday evening, August 4th, 1916, was also favored at other evening sessions by some very practical and helpful lectures and talks by Dr. A. A. Berle of Cambridge, Massachusetts, on "Education Which Educates," and "An Evening of Story Telling" by Dr. Arthur P. Wedge, of Boston, Massachusetts, a narrative lecture, "Les Miserables," by Mr. Richard H. Kennedy, and a lecture by Dr. J. O. Hall, Professor of Social Science, Willamette University, Salem, Oregon, on "Remedies Against Poverty."

The quality and performance of the musical programs during the entire period was most remarkable and cannot be excelled anywhere in the Indian Service. In addition to the numerous well rendered selections by the Chemawa Orchestra at the evening sessions, a special musical program by the Chemawa Indian String Quartet was given on Monday evening, August 7th. This quartet is composed, in addition to the director, of three Indian young men pupils of the school and these pupils play classical music of the highest character with a technique that shows a high degree of the musician's art. Vocal solos were given by Mrs. Clevett, Miss Evelyn Woods, Miss Dorothy Davis, Mr. Waddell and Mr. T. C. Oderman and a Xylophone solo by Mr. Edward Jaquins, and the musical program was supplemented by some excellent readings by Miss Nellie E. Turner, Instructor in Reading at the Institutes, and Mrs. Edward Jaquins of Los Angeles, California.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted by the members of the Institute on Thursday, August 10th, 1916:
